Introduction

Professional Materials

Whether you are pursuing a tenured faculty position or looking for a job outside of academia, developing professional materials is a critical component of any job search strategy. You may need to prepare a curriculum vitae, convert it to a resume, write cover letters, develop research or teaching statements, or prepare a dossier of your credentials.

Interviewing and Negotiating

Whether you are planning a career within or outside of academics, learning to interview and negotiate job offers effectively will be a crucial step to securing the position you want. Once you are invited to interview, it is important to know what to expect in terms of the length, agenda, travel arrangements, and technology available. You should also be prepared to give a presentation or seminar on your research or teaching philosophy. Once you have been offered a
