This course focuses on the principles and practices of career planning and management, including use of self-assessment, career resources, and employability skill guides. May be repeated to a maximum of three (3) credit hours.

Course Objectives

1. Demonstrate purposefully responsible actions related to the life/career planning process;
2. Describe how personal characteristics influence career development;
3. Identify issues within the changing global economy and labor market and how they impact individual and family career systems;
4. Identify appropriate academic major, occupational, and/or employment alternatives in relation to personal characteristics;
5. Use a variety of information resources to explore academic major, occupational, and/or employment options;
6. Describe career development theories and decision-making skills for life/career planning and management;
7. Demonstrate job search strategies and related employment-seeking skills;
8. Formulate action plans and strategies for implementing life/career goals.

Assignments and Evaluations

Unit 1 Explore Family & Educational Experiences (200 points)

- Projects: Students write 1.5-page autobiography Part 1 designed to explore family experience and educational experience (30 points). Student drafts major or occupational exploration sheet for one option (100 points), meets with instructor (5 points), attends a Career Center fair or event (10 points)
- Quizzes: Chapter 1 quiz (10 points) and Unit 1 quiz (25 points) administered via Canvas (open book) with limited time (and accommodations granted as directed by the Office of Accessibility)

- Homework: Complete individualized career assessments (e.g., Self-Directed Search, Career Thoughts Inventory) to explore options (20 points)

Unit 2 Explore Work, Volunteer & Extracurricular Experiences (200 points)

- Projects: Student writes 1.5-page autobiography designed to explore work, volunteer, and extracurricular experience (30 points). Student drafts major or occupational exploration sheet for a second option (if completed previously) (100 points). Student completes AI badge (45 points) to gain competencies in preparing for interviews and gain feedback on resume to prepare for internship and/or job search.
- Quizzes: Unit 2 quiz (25 points) administered via Canvas (open book) with limited time (and accommodations granted as directed by the Office of Accessibility Services).

Unit 3 Explore Current Life/Career Goals (200 points)

- Projects: Student writes 1.5-page autobiography designed to explore current life/career goals (30 points). Student drafts major or occupational exploration sheet (for a third occupation or major if submitted previously) (100 points). Student explores a new platform called Stepping Blocks to learn about salary and career pathways (25 points). Student completes one-minute elevator pitch in front of the class (20 points)
- Quiz: Unit 3 quiz (25 points) administered via Canvas (open book) with limited time (and accommodations granted as directed by the Office of Accessibility Services).
